6:00 PM - Opening Keynote Address. Transparency in Admissions, Higher Education and Society



HARRY BRIGHOUSE is the Mildred Fish Harnack Professor of Philosophy and Carol Dickson Bascom Professor of the Humanities at University of Wisconsin-Madison. He is author or co-author of several books, including *Educational Goods: Values, Evidence and Decision-Making* (U. of Chicago Press, 2018), *Family Values* (Princeton U. Press, 2015), and *On Education* (Routledge, 2005). *The Aims of Higher Education: Problems of Morality and Justice* (U. of Chicago Press, 2016), which he co-edited with Michael McPherson, won the

2017 Frederic W. Ness book award for "the book that best contributes to the understanding and improvement of liberal education" from the Association of American Colleges and Universities.

NICHOLAS HILLMAN is an Associate Professor in the School of Education at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Hillman's research examines how finance, policy and geography shape educational opportunities in the United States. He also directs the Student Success Through Applied Research Lab, a research-practice partnership with the University's Division of Enrollment Management and Office of Student Financial Aid. Hillman is an alumnus of Indiana University-Bloomington and is a faculty affiliate with the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Institute for Research on Poverty and the Robert

M. La Follette School of Public Affairs.



OZAN JAQUETTE is an Assistant Professor of Higher Education in the UCLA Graduate School of Education & Information Studies. His research specializations are organizational behavior, enrollment management, higher education finance and higher education policy. His research program analyzes how postsecondary institutions change behavior to generate enrollment from desired student populations, with a focus on the tensions between the enrollment pursuits of access, academic prestige and revenue generation. His past research analyzes the causes and consequences of out-of-state enrollment

growth by public universities. His current research analyzes recruiting behavior by colleges and universities, utilizing "data science" methodologies and public records requests as data collection strategies.

DONALD HELLER is Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs at the University of San Francisco. He is responsible for the university's five schools, libraries, academic affairs, student life, enrollment management, online programs, branch campuses and international relations. He works in the areas of educational economics, public policy and finance, and he has consulted with the federal government and university systems and policymaking organizations in ten states.

He has testified in front of Congressional committees, state legislatures, and in federal court cases. Heller has over 200 publications, and is editor or co-editor of six books. He has served as a Trustee of DePaul University since 2012 and earned an Ed.D. in higher education from the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Heller holds an Ed.M. in administration, planning, and social policy from Harvard and a B.A. in economics and political science from Tufts University.

10:45 AM - Session 3. Broadening the Definition of Mission Beyond the Institution



SANDY BAUM is a nonresident Senior Fellow at the Urban Institute and Professor Emerita of Economics at Skidmore College. Baum earned her B.A. in sociology at Bryn Mawr College, where she is currently a member of the Board of Trustees, and her Ph.D. in economics at Columbia University. She has written and spoken extensively on issues relating to college access, college pricing, student aid policy, student debt, affordability and other aspects of higher education finance.

Sandy has co-authored the College Board's annual publications *Trends in Student Aid and Trends in College Pricing* since 2002. Through the College Board and the Brookings Institution, she has chaired major study groups that released proposals for reforming federal and state student aid. She is the principal researcher on the Urban Institute's website on college affordability and her recent work includes Urban Institute briefs on Federal Work Study, Parent PLUS loans and college endowments. She is the author of *Student Debt: Rhetoric and Realities of Higher Education Financing* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2016) and co-author with Harry Holzer of *Making College Work: Pathways to Success for Disadvantaged Students* (Brookings Institution Press, 2017).



MICHAEL MCPHERSON served as President of the Spencer Foundation for 14 years before retiring in 2017. Previously, he was President of Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota for seven years. He is a nationally known economist whose expertise focuses on the interplay between education and economics. McPherson is co-author or editor of several books, including *Lesson Plan: An Agenda for Change in American Higher Education*; Crossing the Finish Line: Completing College at America's Public Universities; The Student Aid

Game and Economic Analysis, Moral Philosophy, and Public Policy. McPherson was founding co-editor of the journal Economics and Philosophy. He is currently a Senior Research Fellow at the Mellon Foundation, an adjunct Visiting Professor of Philosophy at Stanford University, and a nonresident Fellow at the Urban Institute.

1:00 PM - Session 4. Leading Change: Senior Leaders Examine What is Possible



TED MITCHELL, former college president and top federal policymaker, became president of ACE on September 1, 2017. His background includes service as president of a private liberal arts college, senior administrator at a state university and trustee of a major research institution. Mitchell was president of Occidental College from 1999-2005 and served as U.S. under secretary of education from 2014 until January 2017, reporting to the secretary of education and overseeing postsecondary education policies and programs.

He also served as vice chancellor and dean of the Graduate School of Education and Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles, and professor and chair of the Department of Education at Dartmouth College. Prior to becoming under secretary of education, Mitchell was chief executive officer of the NewSchools Venture Fund from 2005-2014 and served as the president of the California State Board of Education. After concluding his service at the Department of Education, Mitchell served as a consultant to ACE in the areas of education attainment and innovation and leadership development.



CATHARINE "CAPPY" BOND HILL leads Ithaka S+R's research and consulting initiatives to broaden access to higher education, reduce costs and improve student outcomes. A noted economist whose work focuses on higher education affordability and access, as well as on economic development and reform in Africa, she joined Ithaka S+R in September 2016. She oversees Ithaka S+R's two program areas, working to help the higher education, library, scholarly communication, and museum communities adapt to the technological and

economic context of the 21st century.

From 2006 to 2016, Bond Hill served as the 10th president of Vassar College. Under her leadership, Vassar reinstated need-blind admissions and replaced loans with grants in financial aid for low-income families. While at Vassar, she also established a first-of-its-kind veterans admission partnership with the Posse Foundation, with Vassar enrolling its first eleven veterans as freshmen in 2013. Prior to her Vassar presidency, Bond Hill was the provost of Williams College, where she had chief academic and financial officer responsibilities. She serves on the board of the Yale-NUS College and is senior fellow on the Yale Board of Trustees.



JAMES B. MILLIKEN is a national leader of public higher education with more than 30 years of experience and was named chancellor of The University of Texas System in September 2018. He oversees one of the largest public university systems in the United States with 14 health and academic institutions, including six medical schools. Prior to joining the UT System, Milliken served in top leadership positions at major university systems in three states: The City University of New York (CUNY), the University of

Nebraska (NU) and the University of North Carolina (UNC). In those roles, he led efforts that advanced economic development, online education, global engagement, student access and success. In addition to a bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska, Milliken earned a law degree from New York University. He began his career at a Wall Street law firm but left to become an administrator and professor at NYU. There he discovered a passion for public higher education and the opportunities it offers through affordable access and high quality.

DON HOSSLER is Distinguished Provost and Sonneborn Professor Emeritus at Indiana University Bloomington. He currently serves as a Senior Scholar at the Center for Enrollment Research, Policy and Practice in the Rossier School of Education, at the University of Southern California. He has served as vice chancellor for student enrollment services at Indiana and is the founding director of the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center. He has authored or co-authored 23 books and scholarly reports and more than 100 articles

and book chapters. Hossler has lived in and conducted research in Russia. He has consulted with universities, and educational organizations including the College Board, ETS, Pew Charitable Trusts and in desegregation lawsuits in Alabama and Maryland. Hossler has received career achievement awards from the American College Personnel Association, the Association for Institutional Research, the College Board and the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators.

JIM LARIMORE is Chief Officer for the Center for Equity in Learning at ACT, where he leads ACT's strategy to engage students, families, educators and communities to promote equity in learning and workplace success. Before joining ACT, Larimore's career in higher education focused on college access and student success. He served as deputy director for student success at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and as a student affairs leader at campuses including Stanford, Dartmouth, Swarthmore and NYU Abu Dhabi in the United Arab Emirates.

Larimore serves on the Board of Directors for the Iowa City Community School District Foundation and the Leadership Giving Advisory Board for United Way of Johnson and Washington Counties. He has served on the Advisory Council that created the Gates Foundation's Millennium Scholars Program and currently serves on the board of the Branch Alliance for Educator Diversity, and as an Advisor for Michelle Obama's Reach Higher Campaign, the Aspen Institute's Forum for Community Solutions, the United Negro College Fund's Career Pathways Initiative, the Center for Postsecondary Readiness and Success at American University, and the Hope Center for College, Community and Justice at Temple University.



JIM MONTOYA leads the College Board's membership, governance, and global higher education teams, managing large-scale, high-impact initiatives that promote equity and access for all students. In his role as Secretary of the Corporation, he oversees all matters relating to its governance structure and Board of Trustees. Montoya has held a number of executive roles at the College Board, including vice president of the three Western Regions, vice president for higher education

relationship development, and senior vice president of higher education and international.

Before joining the College Board in 2001, he served at Stanford University as vice provost for student affairs and as dean of admission and financial aid and taught through the Center for Comparative Studies in Race and Ethnicity. Prior to his years at Stanford, Montoya held senior leadership positions at Occidental College and Vassar College, respectively.

MICHAEL REILLY has served as the Executive Director of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (AACRAO) since 2012. Prior to coming to AACRAO, he was the executive director for the Council of Presidents, an association of the six public baccalaureate degree granting institutions in the state of Washington. He has more than 25 years of experience in university administration, admissions and enrollment management, including having been the Associate Vice President for Enrollment Man-

agement at both Central Washington University and Humboldt State University. He served on the American Council on Education Board of Directors and is currently on the College Board's Access and Diversity Collaborative Advisory Council. He is a frequent writer and speaker on public policy matters impacting higher education.



JOYCE SMITH began her service in 1991 as NACAC Associate Executive Director and later, Acting Executive Director before being named NACAC's Executive Director (now CEO) in February 1997. She is the longest serving CEO of NACAC with a record of 22 years.

Prior to joining NACAC, Smith worked in both public and private college admissions at Kansas State University, Amherst College and Queens College of the City University of

New York, where she served as executive director of admissions for undergraduate and graduate admissions, marketing and scholarship services. She was also a program service officer of the Student Search Service and associate director of the Admission Testing Program with the College Board in New York. Smith has served on numerous boards including the Association of Independent School Admission Professionals, the Institute for Higher Education Policy, and the National Research Center for College and University Admissions. She currently serves as a member of the Scholarship America Board of Trustees.

ROBERT MASSA has been an enrollment professional in higher education since 1974 and was on the admission/financial staff at Colgate University and Union College before becoming the dean of enrollment at Johns Hopkins University in 1989. In 1999, he became the vice president for enrollment at Dickinson College and in 2009, moved to Lafayette College, as vice president for marketing and communications. He joined Drew University, first as a consultant and then as their senior vice president in January 2015 and retired in

May 2019. Massa teaches in USC's Enrollment Management and Policy masters program, has authored chapters in six books, and is a frequent contributor to *Inside Higher Ed* and *The Chronicle*. He also serves as the chair of the board of the Character Collaborative. Massa earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Rochester and a doctorate in higher education from Columbia University.

JONATHAN BURDICK became the first chief enrollment leader for Cornell University students in Ithaca and at Cornell Tech in NYC in 2019. Burdick manages the directors of admissions, financial aid and student employment, enrollment compliance, and the university registrar. In a new effort to ensure Cornell's enrollment activities reflect best practices, he also co-supervises the enrollment staff in each of Cornell's six colleges, five professional schools and the Graduate School. His principal areas of practitioner focus

have been expanding equity and opportunity for underserved students in the United States; achieving transformative breadth and depth in international enrollment; and leading innovation in admissions and financial aid review. He is or has been a member-leader for numerous professional organizations including the College Board, the Educational Testing Service, the International Baccalaureate Organization, the Council of International Schools, and the National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC). Burdick received NACAC's award for "Inclusion, Access, and Success" in 2016.



YOULONDA COPELAND-MORGAN is the Vice Provost for Enrollment Management at UCLA. Through her role, she achieves the University's undergraduate enrollment goals and has oversight for undergraduate admission, financial aid and scholarships, Early Academic Outreach Program, BruinCorps, as well as strategic community outreach functions. Copeland-Morgan has been a recognized leader in higher education for more than 35 years. She was a two-term chairman of the Board of Trustees for the College Board and

served an additional seven years on the Board of Trustees. She was inaugural Vice Chair of the College Board's Advocacy and Policy Center. Copeland-Morgan served as an expert witness in a Town Hall Meeting to Vice President Joe Biden and has served for nearly a decade on the Gates Millennium Scholars Advisory Council. She has testified before the U.S. House of Representatives and the California State Legislature.

Copeland-Morgan is a member of the College Board's distinguished College Scholarship Service Hall of Fame and recently received the National Association of College Admission Counseling's Gayle C. Wilson Service to Education Award for leadership and outstanding devotion to students and the admission counseling profession.



STEFANIE NILES currently oversees the offices of admission, financial aid and communications in her role as Vice President for Enrollment and Communications at Ohio Wesleyan University. During her 23-year enrollment career, Niles has served in leadership positions at Dickinson College, Hollins University, Bryn Athyn College and DePauw University. She is the immediate past-president of the 15,000-member National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC), the leading national organization for college admission professionals. In 2017, Niles was the recipient of a Fulbright

grant to examine the system of higher education in France. She has completed the Harvard Institute for Educational Management and the Educational Leadership Academy co-sponsored by the CIC and the AASCU. Niles holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Virginia, a Master of Science in education from Indiana University, and a Doctor of Education in higher education management from the University of Pennsylvania.

ONLINE LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATE FOR ENROLLMENT MANAGERS

Following CERPP's in-depth study of enrollment professionals, we developed an innovative certificate program that cultivates the next generation of leaders and managers in admissions and enrollment managers: USC Leadership in Enrollment Management. First launched in 2012, this online 30-week curriculum features faculty and advisors who are experts in the field from around the country. Since its launch, we have certified 120 leaders in enrollment management, with participants from across the United States and internationally, including Canada and China. This October, we welcomed a robust cohort of higher education and independent school leaders. Endorsing our certificate program as valuable professional development, The Enrollment Management Association awards generous scholarships for up to ten independent school participants each year.

For those who are interested in the 2020 academic year (September 2020-May 2021), we encourage all current and aspiring deans, directors, vice provosts and vice presidents to apply. Completion of the program

will enhance knowledge, hone skills, develop a professional network and help form a deeper understanding of the philosophy and methodology of enrollment management within the institutional and national contexts.

USC COLLEGE ADVISING CORPS

The mission of USC CAC is to improve college outcomes for low-income, first-generation and underrepresented students.

Now in its 7th year, USC CAC has expanded from its 2013 launch with three advisers in three high schools in one school district to 44 advisers in 39 schools in eight districts. Our eight partner school districts are Alhambra, Compton, Downey, El Monte, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Lynwood and West Covina.

By placing well-trained, recent college graduates on public high school campuses as full-time college advisers, USC CAC works toward increasing the rate of college enrollment and completion for high school students within these schools. Our advisers encourage and assist high school students with their college searches, applications, financial aid and transition to postsecondary education.

A partnership between the College Advising Corps and USC, USC CAC also benefits from the generous financial support of the Gilbert Foundation, the California Community Foundation-Los Angeles Scholars Investment Fund and CTBC Bank Corp.

JEROME A. "Jerry" LUCIDO (PhD, University of Arizona) is Professor of Practice, and Executive Director and founder of USC CERPP. As professor and center director, he initiated the master's program in Enrollment Management and Policy at USC, designed and teaches in the USC Leadership in Enrollment Management program, initiated the USC College Advising Corps, conducts research in the areas of admission and enrollment management and hosts an annual conference for admission and enrollment professionals. He is the author of numerous articles and book chapters, an advisor to the Access and Diversity Collaborative, Cambridge International, and

is called upon to speak nationally on issues of college admissions, access and success.
